

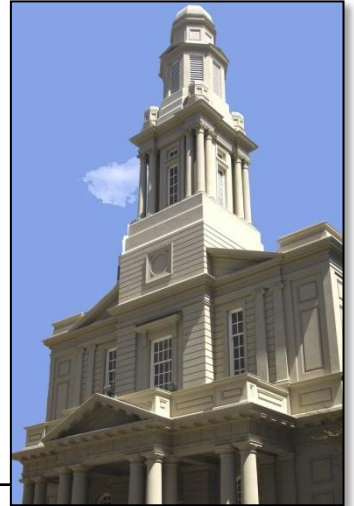

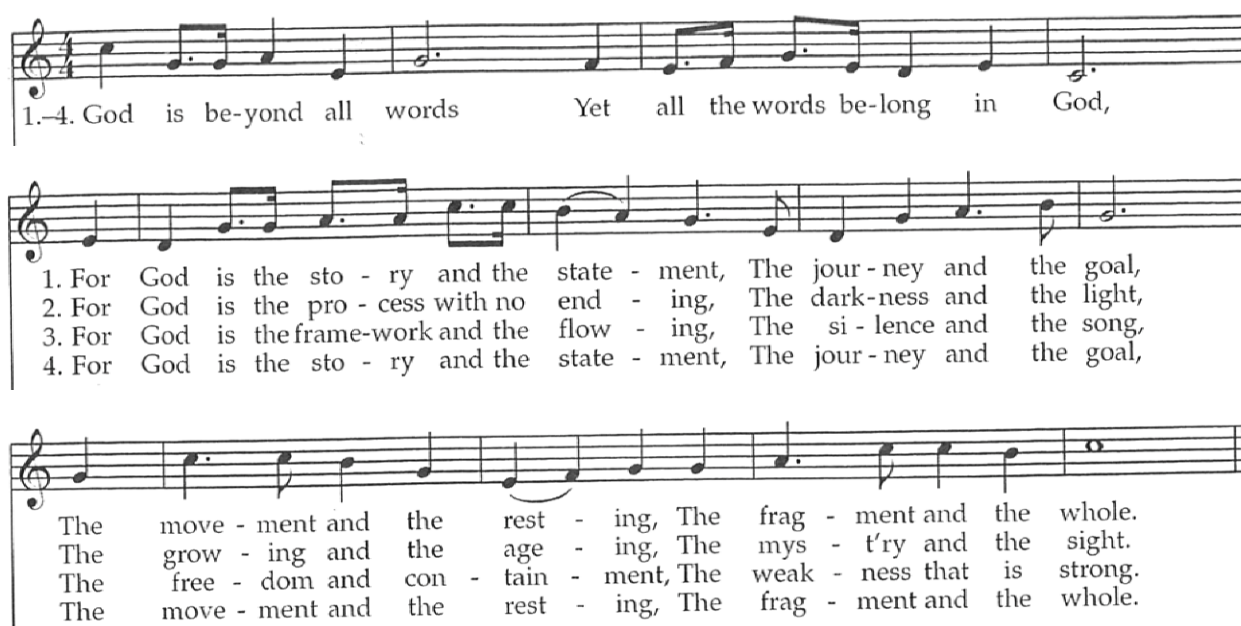

Professor William Cavanaugh completed his PhD (Duke University) under the supervision of Stanley Hauerwas, with a dissertation on “Torture and the Eucharist in Pinochet’s Chile”. His areas of specialisation are: political theology, economic ethics and ecclesiology. He has published an impressive range of books and articles, which have been translated into French, Spanish and Polish. The Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, describes a recent book that Cavanaugh wrote on religious violence as an ‘exceptional monograph’, that is ‘subtle and challenging.’ Cavanaugh is co-editor of the journal of Modern Theology.

We are living in uncertain, unsettled times. Since the Christchurch earthquakes began in September 2010, New Zealanders have an increased awareness of our vulnerability and the fragility of our built environments. The global financial crisis is serious and ongoing. Two additional areas of uncertainty that have become part of our everyday lives. Spiritual uncertainty as participation in institutional religion is decreasing, at least in the first world, while interest in spirituality grows. And social uncertainty, as people worry about family and community and the supports that are needed for societies to thrive. The four part series “Living with Uncertainty” provides us with an opportunity to hear from people with expertise and experience in the areas of geological, spiritual, economic and social uncertainty. While we can't eradicate uncertainty, we can begin to understand the impact that it has on us, and the choices that face us as we attempt to “live well” with uncertainty.

CWS Sahel Food Crisis Appeal

Imagine having to forage for toxic leaves from wild thorn bushes to feed your family today. That's reality now for 28 year old Fatumatou living in Tin'Akoff, Burkina Faso. She is just one of eight million people in West Africa's Sahel region in need of help right now as famine tightens its grip on the region.

Her story sums up the plight of 10 million Sahel people struggling to find food. Christian World Service partners, ACT Alliance, are already there on the ground. Working not just to feed immediate need but to help Sahel people find better ways to farm in future.

People who went through extreme food stress in the droughts of 2009 and 2011 have not had time to rebuild reserves. Now drought is back, harder and deeper than last time.
