

DCM FOODBANK

DCM writes "Around about this time last year, after Christmas and before the May Foodbank Appeal, our shelves experienced a significant shortfall in food items, and it seems this year is no different.

We are down to 'critically low' on the following items: Instant noodles, Meals/tinned stews, Muesli bars, Fruit salad, pears, pineapple, Rolled oats, Muesli, Spreads such as honey, marmite/vegemite

We have approx. 1 week's left of the following: Pasta/curry sauces, Biscuits/crackers, Sardines, Tuna, Salmon

We still have bulk stocks of items such as baked beans, pasta and rice."

MARSDEN CROSS BICENTENNIAL - INVITATION FOR DONATIONS

Below is a message from Richard Randerson of the Marsden Cross Trust Board:

It will be 200 years this year since the CMS missionary, Samuel Marsden, came to Oihi as a guest of Ruatara, the local chief at Rangihoua Pa, adjacent to Oihi.

By Easter an inspiring Welcome Centre will have been completed at the road-end from Kerikeri. The Centre leads on to a Pilgrimage Pathway which will see ten way stations erected along the track down to the Cross. The way-stations tell the story in word and pictures of the coming of Marsden with Ruatara, the preaching of that first sermon at Christmas 1814, and how the Gospel took root in this land in a context of a strong bicultural partnership.

The Centre and Way-stations will be opened around Easter, well in time for the Bicentennial Commemorations at Christmas 2014.

I have been a member of the ecumenical Marsden Cross Trust Board since its inception in 2003. I undertook to raise \$300,000 as the residual cost of the 20 hectares purchased by the Board in 2005. To date \$240,000 is in view, largely by denominational contributions. I need by 31 March to raise the remaining \$60,000.

Gifts of \$100, \$250 or \$500 will help us on the way; some have generously chipped in \$1000. Any amount will be greatly appreciated, and gifts are tax deductible.
