



Writing of Jewish refugee children after World War II

By now the war had been over for a long time. And after a while suffering becomes such a confounded bore. Except, naturally, for the victims... You will remember yourself, when the war was at last finished, your appalled pity for the sufferers... We all wept and agonized, we would have done anything to mitigate the pain, we held out our arms to a battered universe.

But you cannot continue holding out your arms; they grow stiff. You cannot weep forever; the instinct for self-survival is too strong. And so by degrees your compassion wanes; in the end you perform upon it that most drastic of operations, you abort it, you forget it. I do not see how people can possibly do anything else, but the unfortunate and tedious thing is that the mutilated remain boringly mutilated, the deranged remain deranged and have to be hidden away in mental hospitals. All those who are damaged, disturbed and derelict are left to cope alone with an alien and unsympathetic world which has now no time for them,

where once again the normal standards apply, where, once again, the rat-race has begun...

...Compassion should be universal: instead we all limit it to the particular people that interest us, and ignore the rest.

We're trialling an idea for a regular get-together midweek, since some have expressed a wish to know people better. MOP MARCH – CLEAN UP LOW PAY IN WELLINGTON


