


CONTEMPORARY READING

'The Great Emergence'

By Phyllis Tickle in *Sojourners*

Rt. Rev. Mark Dyer, and Anglican bishop known for his wit as well as his wisdom, famously observes ... that about every 500 years the church feels compelled to hold a giant rummage sale. And, he goes on to say, we are living in and through one of those 500-year sales.

.... Only history can expose the patterns and confluences of the past... The first pattern we must consider as relevant to the Great Emergence is Bishop Dyer's rummage sale... That is, as Bishop Dyer observes, about every 500 years the empowered structures of institutionalized Christianity, whatever they may be at that time, become an intolerable carapace, or hard shell, that must be shattered in order that renewal and new growth may occur. When that mighty upheaval happens, history shows us, there are always at least three consistent results or corollary events.

First, a new, more vital form of Christianity does indeed emerge. Second, the organized expression of Christianity that up until then had been the dominant one is reconstituted into a more pure and less ossified expression of its former self. As a result of this usually energetic but rarely benign process, the church actually ends up with two new creatures where once there had been only one. That is, in the course of birthing a brand-new expression of its faith and praxis, the church also gains a grand refurbishment of the older one.

The third result is of equal, if not greater, significance. Every time the incrustations of an overly established Christianity have been broken open, the faith has spread—and been spread—dramatically into new geographic and demographic areas, thereby increasing exponentially the range and depth of Christianity's reach as a result of its time of unease and distress. Thus, for example, the birth of Protestantism not only established a new, powerful way of being Christian, but it also forced Roman Catholicism to make changes in its own structures and praxis. As a result of both those changes, Christianity was spread over far more of the earth's territories than had ever been true in the past.

Distribution

Communion is served by intinction at St Andrew's. Please come to the front of the church and receive the bread, or a gluten-free cracker, taking a piece large enough to dip into the wine (silver cup) or grape juice (pottery cup). Then you're invited to eat the bread dipped in wine or juice.

Or, if you need to, remain in your seat to be served, just indicating to the server.

If you don't wish to receive communion at all, just remain in your seat

or you are welcome to come and receive a blessing (hold your hands crossed in front).
