## **DOING OUR BIT – MESSAGE FROM SUE MCRAE**

There was an event held at St Andrew's organised by DOING OUR BIT – a small volunteer organisation running a campaign to Double the Quota (New Zealand's refugee quota). The tone of the event was very positive and realistic. They are not aiming to flood the country with refugees but merely double the very low NZ quota, which has not changed for over 25 years.

The plan is to gather in support of this idea and spell out the words DOUBLE THE QUOTA on Parliament lawn on **Thursday 31 March**. If you would like to be involved, be at Parliament just after midday to help spell out the words at 12.15pm. The petition to Double the Quota will be handed over to politicians at 12.30pm but we need to assemble there in good time to make it work. Talk to Sue McRae for more details or pick up one of the booklets or leaflets at the back of the church, which contain practical information on what we can all do to help refugees feel at home in New Zealand.
