





Contemporary reading

*from The Bad Christian's Manifesto
By Dave Tomlinson pp192-194*

...the reality is that there is a sheep and a goat in each one of us — there certainly is in me. Divine judgement has to be more sophisticated than simply telling the Ronnie Biggs of this world to stand on one side, and churchgoing Christians to stand on the other.

I love the work of Robert Lentz, the Franciscan icon painter, whose icons include images of unconventional saints like Albert Einstein, Black Elk, Steve Biko and Harvey Milk. When Lentz was commissioned to paint an icon of Jesus as the Good Shepherd, he agreed, with the proviso that there would be no cute woolly lambs anywhere near him.

The Good Shepherd is about sinners, the people we push to the margins, Robert Lentz says, 'the ones we want to forget or even destroy. He is about addicts and sex-offenders and shysters and punks. If I am going to paint the Good Shepherd, he is going to be holding a goat, and not just any goat, a smelly, lustful, scary old billy goat!'

...his Christ would hug such a beast to remind puritanical Christians that God's ways are not to be confused with ours.

The Franciscan monk painted the goat, hair by hair, and was surprised at the end when it seemed ready to jump into his arms. 'There was too much of me in the goat that I did not want to acknowledge and see. Lentz writes 'He demanded that I embrace myself with compassion and look at other human beings with new understanding.'

Each of our souls has billy-goat parts — wild, 'untamed and undomesticated parts — that don't fit with our idealised image of ourselves or with how we wish to be seen, so we keep them hidden from public view.
