WELCOME

On February 28, 2008 Karen Armstrong won the TED Prize and made a wish: for help creating, launching and propagating a Charter for Compassion. Since that day, thousands of people contributed to the process so that on November 12, 2009 the Charter was unveiled to the world.

The Charter for Compassion is a document that transcends religious, ideological, and national differences.

Supported by leading thinkers from many traditions, the Charter calls on us all to activate the Golden Rule around the world.

The Charter for Compassion is an open and collaborative effort. People of all nations, all faiths, and all backgrounds, submitted their own words for inclusion in the Charter.

Karen Armstrong responded to requests for a practical step-by-step guide to living compassionately with the publication of *Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life*. To further extend the exploration of Karen's new book, the Charter for Compassion team invited people to create a reading group in their community. This is what the Exploring Faith group here has been reading, discussing and practising this year.

MINDFULNESS MEDITATION

OPENING Video "The Charter for Compassion"

The principle of compassion lies at the heart of all religious, ethical and spiritual traditions, calling us always to treat all others as we wish to be treated ourselves. Compassion impels us to work tirelessly to alleviate

the suffering of our fellow creatures, to dethrone ourselves from the centre of our world and put another there, and to honour the inviolable sanctity of every single human being, treating everybody, without exception, with absolute justice, equity and respect.

It is also necessary in both public and private life to refrain consistently and empathically from inflicting pain. To act or speak violently out of spite, chauvinism, or self-interest, to impoverish, exploit or deny basic rights to anybody, and to incite hatred by denigrating others—even our enemies—is a denial of our common humanity. We acknowledge that we have failed to live compassionately and that some have even increased the sum of human misery in the name of religion.

We therefore call upon all men and women \sim to restore compassion to the centre of morality and religion \sim to return to the ancient principle that any interpretation of scripture that breeds violence, hatred or disdain is illegitimate \sim to ensure that youth are given accurate and respectful information about other traditions, religions and cultures \sim to encourage a positive appreciation of cultural and religious diversity \sim to cultivate an informed empathy with the suffering of all human beings—even those regarded as enemies.

We urgently need to make compassion a clear, luminous and dynamic force in our polarized world. Rooted in a principled determination to transcend selfishness, compassion can break down political, dogmatic, ideological and religious boundaries. Born of our deep interdependence, compassion is essential to human relationships and to a fulfilled humanity. It is the path to enlightenment, and indispensable to the creation of a just economy and a peaceful global community


ST VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY
