Programme

Haydn Sonata in F Hob 23 (1774)

This sonata starts off with a lively Allegro with lots of demo-semiquavers giving it a very busy and cheeky nature. Next comes an Adagio with a rather melancholy quality and reminds me somewhat of the second movement of Mozart's Sonata in F K280. The piece ends with a dramatic and cheeky finale which is full of quirky harmonic and dynamic changes which Haydn is known for.

Debussy ("sunken cathedral") Prelude Bk 1 (1909-1910)

An image I like to use for this particular piece is that of a lake shrouded in mist during dawns first light. Suddenly out of nowhere a massive cathedral is seen rising out of the lake dripping with cold unforgiving water from the dark depths. This is when you can hear the deep ponderous organ coming from within the mighty halls ringing its power for all to here. Just as soon as it has appeared the cathedral sinks back into the depths only to be shrouded in mist again and the sound of those mighty bellows becomes almost inaudible.

Liszt Ballade no 2 (1853)

A Ballade is portrayed as either a life event or the story of a hero or legend. The myth I like to use to describe the tragic and deep nature of this piece is that of Hero and Leander. Hero was a priestess of Aphrodite and lived in a tower across the ocean from a village. After meeting Leander she allowed him to make love her, but in order to be together Leander would have to swim cross the said ocean. Hero would use a light to guide him but on one particularly stormy night the light went out and Leander lost his way. Learning of his passing Hero tossed herself off the cliff to her death in order to be with him in the afterlife.

Chopin Polonaise in A no 3 (1838)

I thought I would end this concert with the lively and famous military Polonaise as it is sometimes referred to. The piece has a very bouncy and structured nature. There are three section in ABA form which move from A major, D major with a new theme and then back to a repeat of the first section. After the dark a gloomy Liszt I thought this would be an ideal piece to lighten the mood somewhat.

Biography

Louis has been learning piano since the age of ten but did not discover the wonders of classical music until thirteen. Since then he has been involved in many concerts throughout he Nelson and Wellington regions. His most memorable concerts include playing Grieg's piano concerto with the Nelson Symphony Orchestra and also performing at the expressions art centre in Upper Hutt. As well as solo concerts he has also participated in many other events including big sing (accompanying), chamber music groups and other local concert type activities. His most notable awards include the NZSM directors scholarship and the expressions trust prize. Louis' goal in life is to be active on the music scene as a concert pianist, teaching and also helping out groups such as choirs, musicals and other such organisations where needed.
