Programme (programme notes supplied by performers)

Sonata in D major K 119 & Sonata in G major K 427

Domenico Scarlatti (1685-1757)

Mitchell Henderson

Though Italian by birth, Scarlatti spent most of his adult life living on the Iberian Peninsula. K. 119 shows the deep influence Iberian music had on Scarlatti, imitating the impassioned style of Spanish guitar.

K. 427 is a cheerful, upbeat toccata. Written with the unusual tempo indication "as fast as possible", the piece is filled with light-hearted gesture and tongue-in-cheek drama.

Sonata No 6 in F major Op.10 No 2

Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827)

Movement 1 (Allegro) and Movement 3 (Presto)

Beethoven's early works were strongly influenced by earlier composers, particularly his teacher Haydn, from whom Beethoven developed a tendency for humour. The first movement explores contrast in both dynamic and melody, with sudden fortes on a single note, and a melody based around either short 'false starts' and long, winding passages. The third movement imitates a Bach-style fugue, using fugal sonority as window dressing of a light-hearted melody-and-accompaniment sonata, where Beethoven only returns to counterpoint when it suits him.

Romanian Dance No 1 Béla Bartók (1881-1945) Tone Clock Piece No 4 Jenny McLeod (b. 1941)

Hungarian composer Béla Bartók travelled all over Central Europe and the surrounding regions collecting folk songs, often in the company of fellow Hungarian Zoltán Kodaly. Together they were responsible for documenting a huge amount of original folk material that might otherwise have been lost forever. This is the first in a set of six pieces based on dances from Romania. Jenny McLeod studied at the newly-formed Victoria University Music Department in the 1960s with Frederick Page, Douglas Lilburn and David Farquhar, and she would later become the youngest Professor to join the faculty there. In between she travelled to Europe to study with Olivier Messiaen who would become a life-long friend and mentor. The Tone Clock pieces began life in the 1980s, with the most recent composed in 2011.

Sinfonia from Partita No 2 in C minor Nocturne in C minor Op.48 No 1

J.S.Bach (1685-1750)

Frèderic Chopin (1810-1849)

The opening movement from Bach's second partita in C minor is a collage of different moods and styles. The opening, very dramatic and rhythmic, leads into a languid recitative section. A fast and vibrant section with plenty of Bach's trademark counterpoint brings the movement to a close.

Chopin's Nocturne in C minor is much more solemn than is usually expected of Chopin's nocturnes, with an almost funereal march-like character. The opening section returns, thick and thunderous, after a much more spacious and open interlude.

Cat and Mouse

Aaron Copland (1900-1990)

The Cat and the Mouse is a piece based on the poem with a similar name written by the French poet Jean de la Fontaine. It is the first of his works to be published and was written shortly before his schooling in Paris, France. The poem, The Old Cat and the Young Mouse, is about a cat catching a mouse and eventually consuming it. The moral of the story is that the young can never beat the experienced and you can hear the different sections of the piece expressing the different feelings of the mouse as the piece progresses.

Toccata

Francis Poulenc (1899-1963)

Poulenc's Toccata comes from a set of Three Pieces for Piano written in 1928 and revised in 1953. It is a boisterous and extrovert short work which juxtaposes percussive repeated note figures with fragments of lyrical melodies.
