

It is indeed good to give thanks for in our lifetimes we have come and gone, farewelled others and welcomed them back; We have known what it is like to be away from home and what it is like to return.

Sometimes the pain of parting has helped us grow and the welcome has been heart-warming

We see Jesus leave home and return, not always receiving a warm welcome yet continuing to do what he needed to do for his own integrity and the good of others.

We give thanks the Gospel story of parent and children tells us, no matter how many ties we might strain of kinship and relationship, there is always welcome at the gate to home.

Sharing in this feast of life symbolises that welcome, that reception, that embrace of Love, just as a loving parent welcomes their child home with a feast.

So we say today in our own words what others have expressed through the centuries:

Holy, holy One, filled with power and might Heaven and earth are filled with your glory; the glory of the power that is Love; Blessed are those who come in the name of all that is life-giving and loving. Hosanna in the highest, let gratitude ring across the sky.

We have been told that the night Jesus was betrayed he first gathered with his friends (people much like us) for the feast of the Passover.

After supper, we are told, he took bread and when he had given thanks, broke it, and said,

'This is my body, which is for you: this do in remembrance of me. Also the cup, after supper, saying words like,

'This cup is the new covenant: this do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'

We give thanks for these elements, grain from earth and juice from vine asking that they might nourish us for our spiritual journey. AMEN

Communion is served by intinction. You are invited to come to the front of the church and receive the bread, or a gluten-free cracker, taking a piece large enough to dip into the wine (silver cup) or grape juice (pottery cup). Eat the bread dipped in wine or juice. Or, remain in your seat to be served if mobility is difficult.

If you don't wish to receive communion, you may remain in your seat we are glad you are here with us.

Post-Holocaust: Continued Persecutions of Sexual Dissidents since World War II

William J Spurlin, Brunel University

Wellington, New Zealand Tuesday, 8 March, 12:15pm – 1pm

This lecture provides a contextual overview of the experiences of gay men and lesbians under National Socialism, especially the ways in which the Nazi regime targeted homosexual men and the varying degrees of tolerance and actual persecution directed by the regime toward lesbians. Operating on the



premise that Nazi homophobia must not be reduced to a momentary aberration in history, the main focus of the lecture addresses the ways in which homophobia continued to find expression in the post-war criminalisation of homosexuality in both the former West and East Germany, and the failure to recognise more broadly across Europe the crimes perpetrated against gay and lesbian victims of Nazi atrocities. The postwar medicalisation of homosexuality, evident in the diagnostic history of homosexuality in the various editions of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM), whereby homosexuality was pathologised initially as a sociopathic disturbance in DSM-I (1952), and then as a psychopathology in DSM-II (1968), aligned psychiatry and biomedicine with the social and cultural perpetuation of gender and sexual norms throughout the 1950s and 1960s. Even after the historic 1973 decision to remove homosexuality from the DSM, pathologisation continued with the entry of a new diagnostic category 'Gender Identity Disorder in Children' (DSM-III, 1980), which remained in the DSM until 2013 and is aimed at gender-atypical children and the fear of gay outcome, the traces of which remain in the current DSM-V in the revised diagnostic category 'Gender Dysphoria in Children.'

The lecture also examines medical and social discourses about homosexuality that repathologised it in the early days of the HIV/AIDS pandemic in the West whilst examining continued pathologisations and stigmas in the postcolonial and developing world around HIV/AIDS. The lecture concludes by addressing gender and sexual rights as human rights and addressing violent crimes that continue to be perpetuated against gender-atypical children, gay men, the transgendered, and lesbians in the present day, as well as the continued criminalisation of homosexuality in many parts of the world. By illuminating the ways in which homophobia intersects with other forms of domination and continues to shape contemporary society and culture, and by approaching historical sources on the Holocaust and National Socialism with new questions about sexuality and gender, we deepen the meaning of the Holocaust and help shape its ongoing significance.
