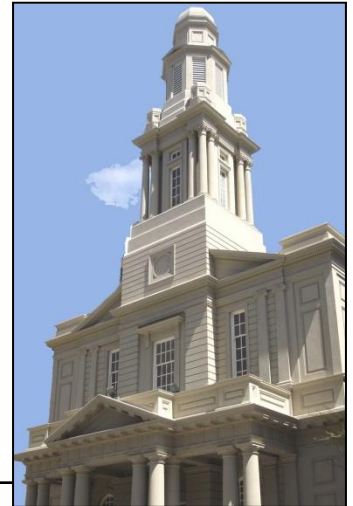

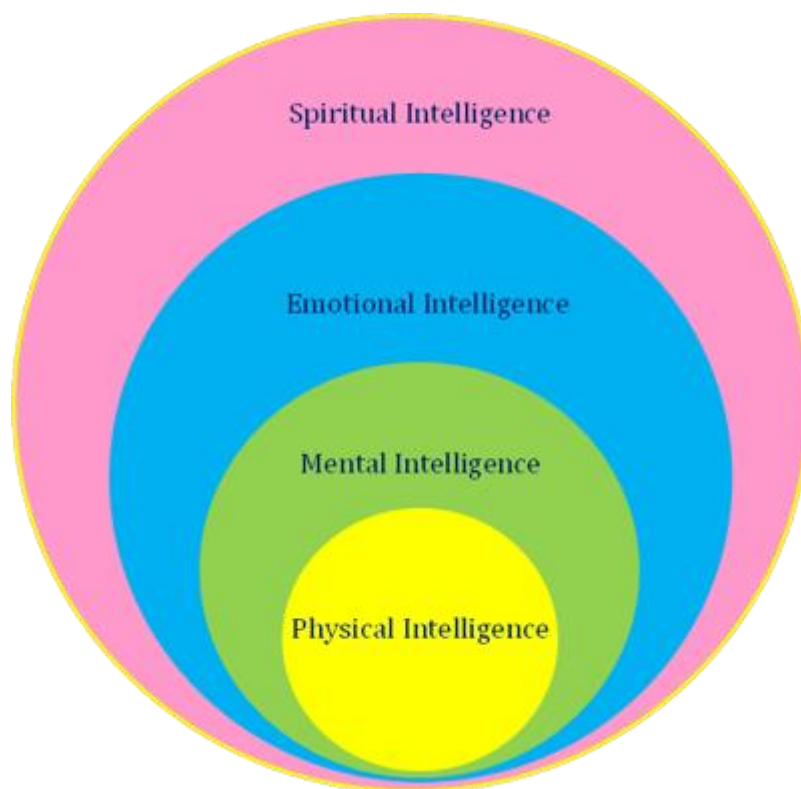

*From How to be a bad Christian.. and a better human being  
By Dave Tomlinson pp 40-41*

Spiritual intelligence is thinking with the soul. Paul's questioning which so unsettled the people in his church, was not just at an intellectual level: it came from his soul. He longed for deeper meaning and deeper answers, and this led him to deconstruct his faith – not in a negative way or for negative reasons, but as part of his inner journey. ... it was clear that he still held many of his original beliefs, but he held them in a different way. He had needed to reconstruct them within a different, larger framework.

Quite legitimately churches are places where beliefs are taught and affirmed, but they must also be places where spiritual intelligence is nurtured. This means creating the space where beliefs can be questioned and doubted and explored – in an open fashion. There is no problem with reciting creeds as classic symbols of faith, provided we can also interrogate them, argue with them and debate about them – and perhaps write some new ones that grapple with the meaning of faith in the twenty first century rather than the first!

... Paul is a classic 'bad Christian'; someone with a fairly well developed SQ, but a low threshold of tolerance for religious crap; someone with an effective moral compass, but impatient with rigid moral codes.

The Psalms in the Old Testament comprise poems/prayers/invocations directed to God and written by people a very long time ago. In the twenty first century let's compile another set of psalms.

We simply need poems nominated which St Andrew's people have found...

- nourish their soul and/or develop their wisdom
- inform about the sacred/human intersection
- offer help on the journey of life.
- develop and grow their spirituality/faith/discernment
- increase awe, wonder and reverence (any or all of the above)



It's easy:

1. Choose your poem - this may be a poem you have **written yourself** (bravo) or a poem **by someone else** chosen from your own reading (also bravo) –anything from the last 1600 years or so.
2. Write a brief paragraph about why this poem is your choice (connecting with at least one of the reasons above. It may help others access the intent of the poem in hearing your thoughts about it)
3. Type out the poem itself and its Author and title and also your "why" paragraph.
4. Email the poem and also your reason for choosing it to the church office - [office@standrews.org.nz](mailto:office@standrews.org.nz) - or post/hand it in to the office with your name and contact details and the details of the book where you got it from. Head your email 'The second psalms'.
5. Do this by the mid-June (say 15th).

A selection of nominations will be presented at a St Andrew's Sunday gathering on July 17th as part of the service. All nominated poems and the "why they were chosen" will be printed in a booklet available to everyone a little later.

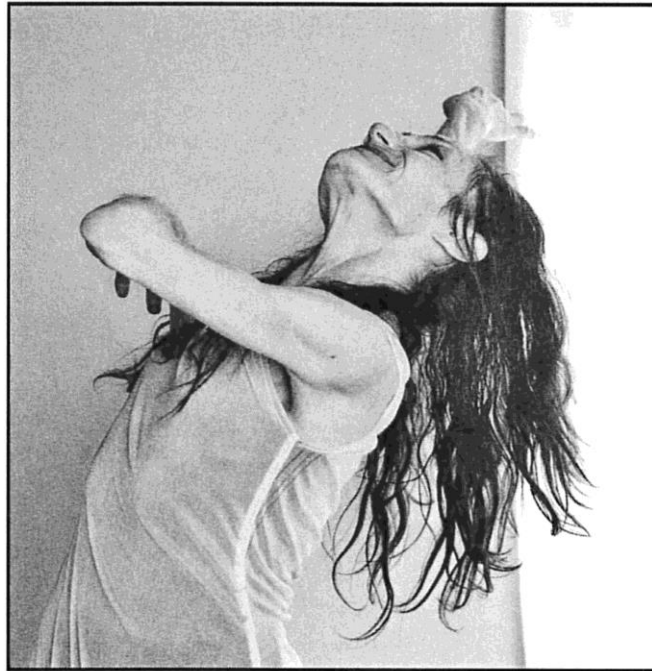
