"Trinitarian Community and Social Liberation"

By Leonardo Boff and Paul Burns CrossCurrents Vol. 38, No. 3 (Fall 1988), p. 289

The conviction that has guided all debates on the trinity: that the eternal God is three – Father Son and Holy Spirit – has to be presented in the most real way possible, this is the primordial and essential question, with that of the unity of the Three Persons following later. But affirming the real existence of the Three is not enough: we have to place equal stress on the relationship that obtains between them; the existence of the one God is made up of the most complete communion and the most absolute and eternal participation. The unity of the three Persons expresses the infinite dynamism of communion and interpenetration prevailing in the Holy Trinity. Leonardo Boff was one of the key figures in the South American liberation theology movement

BLOWIN' IN THE WIND

St Andrew's expedition to the wind farm at Makara is planned for this Sunday afternoon, weather permitting, following our parish lunch. Dene Halverson has six places in his coach at \$20 each. Bring walking shoes, parkas with hoods, gloves. Our expedition had been postponed to avoid disturbing lambing during August and September.

In physics-speak, hills, ridges and escarpments all cause the wind blowing over them to go faster, up to half as fast again as the same wind blowing over flat ground. But by comparison with water or steam the energy is dilute, so the rotating blades that harness some of that energy need to be huge and there must be many of them. The moving air, the breath, the spirit, is part of creation. We perceive it by its speed and its substance, we value its generosity in giving of itself. When we stand under a mighty blade, watching it scything down towards us, we can feel awe. But when we look across the hills and the seas, we can be reminded of the spirit of God moving upon the face of the waters, humbling us into submission.

TE WHAKAHOUTANGA | FOSTERING THE GOOD, TRUE AND BEAUTIFUL

E rau rangatira mā, tihei mauri ora! Nei rā te reo maioha o te komiti whakahaere a Te Whakahoutanga e mihi ana ki a koutou, e hoa mā. Mā te Wairua Tapu e whakangākau tā tātou mahi tahi.

You are warmly invited to join in Te Whakahoutanga: Fostering the Good, True and Beautiful.

Te Whakahoutanga, meaning 'the renewal', provides an opportunity for Christian scholars and researchers from across the disciplines to step back from their daily routines. It is not your usual academic conference; it is rather something like a minisabbatical. This hui creates space for rejuvenation and restoration. Taking place on Victoria's beautiful Te Herenga Waka Marae on 15–16 February, the kaupapa seeks to make room for plenty of karakia, kai and kōrero. We will be inspired by listening to stories from emerging Kiwi scholars from a broad range of disciplines. Wellington is always lovely in February, and there will be time to sit around and bask in the sunshine, while lazily dunking gingernuts biscuits into a warm cuppa tea and talking with new friends.

The conference is for Christians engaged in research or scholarship, including university faculty, postgraduate students, independent scholars, and researchers working for government and the commercial sector.

10am Saturday 15 February – 4pm Sunday 16 February.

The hui will take place at Te Herenga Waka Marae, Victoria University of Wellington (46 Kelburn Parade, Wellington). The wharenui can sleep up to 70 people on Saturday 15 February. Space is reserved on a first come, first served basis. You can indicate this on the registration form. If you intend to stay on the wharenui, you will need to provide your own pillow and sleeping bag (or similar). Mattresses will be provided.

Two lunches, dinner on Saturday, and breakfast on Sunday will be provided at Te Herenga Waka Marae, and these are included in the cost for the hui.

Whānau is more than welcome on Saturday afternoon and evening. An all-age, family-friendly option will be included among the workshops on Saturday afternoon. Dinner on Saturday will be a little bit special and whānau are more than welcome to join in the fun. The evening will be relaxed and family-friendly, with lots of kai and a celebratory vibe. If any family members come along, we'd greatly appreciate a koha to help cover meal costs. Early bird conference fees, for registrations by 16 December 2019, are \$40 waged and \$20 student / unwaged. Late registrations after this date are \$100 waged and \$50 student / unwaged.
