## **Programme**

### Adagio in F major, Hob. XVII:9 (1758) Joseph Haydn (1732-1809)

This little adagio displays Haydn's characteristic gifts of clarity and subtlety, and serves as a prelude to the following Mozart sonata.

# Piano Sonata No. 15 in F Major, K.533/494 (1788) W.A. Mozart (1756-1791)

With its simple, unassuming beginning, the opening of Mozart's K. 533 sonata belies the level of contrapuntal and melodic invention to follow. Influenced by the polyphonic writing of Bach and Handel, here Mozart combines his characteristic crystalline melodies and rippling pianistic figures with ingenious imitation between the hands.

The second movement is Mozart at his most poignant and reflective, the striking chromaticism of the harmony recalling the Dissonance Quartet K.465. With capability and depth, he exploits the possibilities of chromaticism for maximum poignancy and expressive effect.

The blithe rondo provides a marked contrast in mood. Written as a standalone piece in 1786, Mozart revised it slightly to form the third movement of the sonata. A 27-bar addition near the end, including a little fughatto passage and a cadenza-like section, serves to add weight and balance the lightness of the rondo with the other movements of the sonata.

# **Biography**

Ingrid Schoenfeld is a classical pianist and accomplished teacher. She completed her Bachelor of Music in Classical Performance with first-class Honours at the New Zealand School of Music. She made her orchestral debut in 2016 with the Nelson Symphony Orchestra, playing Shostakovich's 2nd piano concerto. Ingrid studied conducting at the New Zealand School of Music under Kenneth Young, and has conducted and accompanied multiple choirs around Wellington. She is currently Musical Director of the Festival Singers of Wellington. In addition to performing regularly in solo, chamber, and choral concerts, she runs a successful teaching studio.
