La Nuit (Night)

We bless the sweet night Whose cool kiss sets us free Beneath its veils We live without unrest. Devouring care flees, The fragrance of the air intoxicates us; We bless the sweet night Whose fresh kiss frees us.

Pale dreamer pursued by a god, Rest and close your book. In the frost-white heavens A stream of stars shivers and gleams, We bless the sweet night.

La Réveil (The Dream)

Arise, my heart! The lark is already singing Shaking its wings in the sunlight. Cast off sleep, my heart, for the violet is raising to God the incense of its awakening. Each living, well-rested flower opens in turn its eyes to see in its chalice a dewdrop, pearl of a day, its mirror.

We sense in the pure air that the angel of the roses has passed in the night to bless the flowers. All of them have opened for him, who comes from on high to refresh their colours.

Artist biographies

Georgia Jamieson Emms studied at Victoria University and then sang professionally in Hamburg, Germany for several years before returning home. She sings opera, oratorio and musical theatre, is a vocal and diction coach, and the founder and director of Wanderlust Opera. When she is not singing, teaching, or touring, she is translating operas into English, writing scripts and libretti.

Barbara Paterson returned to NZ from New York City in 2016. She maintains a full teaching studio and enjoys a busy schedule as an operatic soprano, chamber musician, and choral conductor. She has sung for Stroma, the CANZ annual Nelson workshops, Wanderlust Theatre, Unstuck Opera, Eternity Opera, NZ Opera, NIMBY Opera, and as a soloist for choral societies around the country.

Mark Dorrell is a highly sought-after and vastly experienced vocal coach, accompanist and conductor. He studied at Cambridge University, the Royal College of Music and the National Opera Studio, later serving on the music staff of Scottish Opera. He conducted the original London production of Into the Woods, and at the National Theatre such major productions as A Little Night Music, Oklahoma, and Sweeney Todd.
