



She has also worked at Te Puni Kōkiri as an analyst in areas of Treaty settlements and Crown-Māori relationships. Having recently completed a Master of Educational Psychology, Kathryn is currently working as an intern educational psychologist with Resource Teachers: Learning and Behaviour.
