Programme notes:

György Kurtág (b 1926) is a Hungarian pianist and composer of music with a huge breadth of creative imagination. Much of his output is intense, atonal and experimental. He wrote homages to many composers and transcribed works by several others, including these by Bach, who was one of his major inspirations. Kurtág is known to have said that "one note is almost enought', realisting that one can make music out of almost nothing: his writing is free from any excess material, a feature that brings purity and clarity to these transcriptions.

This sonata for four hands was written by Mozart at the age of 16. The work is in three movements with a fast and very carefree first movement, a slower but still quite pleasant second movement, marked 'andante', and an energetic third movement - the fastest of them all.

Though composed by a young Mozart, this work could well be from his mature period due to its mastery of character, structure and harmony.

A relatively unknown work from an historically neglected composer, this sonata for four hands, in Bb major, could be summarized in one word: delightful. The wonderfully lyrical theme of the first movement puts the listener at ease and the movement unfolds naturally, as though no other way was possible. The second movement consists of a set of variations, in D major. The beauty of this movement lies in its childlike simplicity. With quintessential 4 and 8 bar phrasing and perfect structural symmetry in each variation, a sense of purity can be felt and heard. A short but slow coda, marked 'adagio', finishes the movement. Back in Bb major, the final movement is the most energetic and bubbly of the three. With a continuous stream of staccato semiquavers in the primo part the piece bounces along nicely. Triumphantly, the work concludes with a strong cadence in Bb major.

Biography

Sunny: Sunny Cheng is a Wellington-based pianist and piano teacher. She has been a full-time teacher since 2013. Sunny grew up in Beijing, China and moved to New Zealand in 2007 with the dream of pursuing a career in music. She studied

privately with Judith Clark, and then studied piano performance at the New Zealand School of Music underDiedre Irons and Dr. Jian Liu.

As well as maintaining a busy teaching schedule, Sunny still finds time to be an active performer. She enjoys playing solo repertoire and chamber music, and performs regular piano duet concerts, piano trio concerts, and she is also involved with various other chamber ensembles.

Sunny is a committee member of the IRMT Wellington branch, and her students regularly compete in their events. She is also on the committee of The Wellington Piano and Instrumental Group, and many of her students enjoy participating in their 6 annual concerts.

Otis: Otis is a Wellington-born pianist and a classical performance student at Victoria University of Wellington's New Zealand School of Music. He began his piano studies with Erin Taylor at the age of five and he studied with Emma Sayers from 2018-2020. Otis is currently studying under Dr. Jian Liu.

Otis has been successful in local competitions, winning 1st prize in the IRMTNZ Tertiary Sonata Competition in 2019, 2020, and 2021, as well as placing first at the IRMTNZ Recital Contest in 2019 and 2020. Otis has also been successful at national competitions: In 2020 he was awarded 1st prize at the New Zealand Junior Piano Competition and recently was

awarded 1st prize at the Lewis Eady National Piano Competition, New Zealand's national piano competition.

Otis enjoys chamber music and has played in many ensembles. One of these groups won a silver award at the 2020 NZCT Chamber Contest; another won a bronze award at the 2019 NZCT Chamber Contest. Otis was selected to attend the 2021 and 2022 Adam Summer School for Chamber Music in Nelson. He has also dedicated his time to teaching piano since 2017.
