Programme

Ballade & Serenade Op 3

Czech composer and violinist Josef Suk was brought up in a musical family, and became one of Dvorák's favourite students. Indeed, Suk went on to marry Dvorak's daughter, and was later heartbroken to lose both Dvorák and his wife in the same year. He was regarded as one of the leading composers in Czech modernism, and performed as second violin for the Czech (later Bohemian) Quartet.

Relatively early works, the Ballade is intense and romantic in style, while the Serenade takes a lighter, more playful tone.

Grave – Metamorphoses for 'cello & piano (1981) Witold Lutosławski (1913-1994)

The Polish composer Lutosławski has said: "I wrote *Grave* or cello and piano to honour the memory of Stefan Jarociński. As is known, he devoted a great part of his activity to Debussy's music. So I considered it appropriate to use the first four notes from *Pelléas et Mélisande* at the beginning of my piece, the four notes becoming the point of departure for the melody in the cello part. The composition takes the form of metamorphoses, in the course of which - as in my *Funeral Music* - the rhythmic values undergo a gradual breakup, which creates the illusion of an ever faster tempo. Before the very end of the composition, the four notes from *Pelléas* return".

Sonata for Cello & Piano No 2 H.286

Bohuslav Martinů (1890-1959)

Written in 1941, Czech composer Martinů's second sonata for cello and piano was one of the first works he completed after emigrating from France to the US to escape the Gestapo. In this work Martinů embraced classical forms, though the first movement is typically vigorous and energetic in his most rhythmic manner. The second movement is full of passionate longing, with a gorgeous lyrical cello line, whilst the finale uses the composer's characteristic motor rhythms, with powerful stamping gestures suggesting Bohemian peasant dances.

Josef Suk (1874-1935)

Rachel Thomson - piano

Rachel Thomson was born in Dunedin, New Zealand, and grew up in Wellington where she began her piano studies with her mother. She went on to study with Judith Clark, graduating from Victoria University of Wellington before continuing her studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music in the United States, where she gained a doctorate in piano performance.

Rachel regularly performs with some of the country's leading musicians. She has toured on numerous occasions for Chamber Music New Zealand and is a member of various chamber ensembles including the Koru Trio. She has worked as an orchestral pianist with the NZSO, Orchestra Wellington, and the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra. Rachel is also active as a teacher, adjudicator and accompanist.

Rachel has been a national recording artist for Concert FM, and also recorded for Trust Records with flutist Bridget Douglas.

Robert Ibell - cello

Robert Ibell was born in Dannevirke and brought up in Palmerston North. While training there as a school teacher he learned cello from Judith Hyatt in Wellington.

Between 1986 and 1992 Robert lived in London, studying cello with Tanya Prochazka, Derek Simpson and Christopher Bunting. He played at music schools and in masterclasses (where his teachers included Alexander Baillie, Steve Doane, Anner Bylsma and Steven Isserlis), taught, gave recitals and played in professional and amateur orchestras.

From 1993 to 2019 Robert was a member of the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra. He is now a cello and double bass teacher, chamber music coach, adjudicator and freelance performer. Robert is a member of the Aroha String Quartet, square piano/cello duo Hammers & Horsehair and indie/folk/rock band Milkthistle.
