



At St Andrew's we want you to feel at home—to join in with the activities of our community of faith, or to come and find your own spiritual place in your own time. Wellington City Council has introduced a COVID response package which includes some temporary changes to street parking in the city. On Saturday and Sunday the time limit for most metered parks has been extended to 180 minutes, 8am-8pm (compared to weekdays 8am-5pm when it is 120 minutes but extends to 180 minutes 5-8pm). The weekend charge had been reduced to \$1/hour. This change is set to run from 21 March to 30 June 2022. If you have parked on the street initially and are staying for an after-church activity, it may be possible to move your car into the St Andrew's/Braemar car park but please be careful that you do not block anyone in.

SPIRITED CONVERSATIONS

We have decided to start Spirited Conversations again. The first meeting will be on Tuesday 14 June starting at 7 pm in the upstairs Conference Rooms 1 and 2. As the rooms are not available until that time, we are suggesting that folk who would like a meal beforehand go to Little Penang on The Terrace where the good food will be accompanied by good conversation! Our speaker is Dave Lowe, Climate Scientist and Nobel Prize Winner.

In the early 1970s, budding Kiwi scientist Dave Lowe was posted at an atmospheric-monitoring station at Baring Head, Wellington. On a shoestring salary he measured carbon in the atmosphere, collecting vital data towards what became one of the most important discoveries in modern science.

What followed was a lifetime's career marked by hope and despair, as realisation dawned of what his measurements meant for the future of the planet. Dave has faced down climate deniers, foot-dragging bureaucracy and widespread complacency to open people's eyes to the effects of increasing fossil fuel emissions on our atmosphere.

Dave's talk will outline his personal and family life with his focus on science and his innovative flair that grew from working with other top scientists. He is a wonderful speaker. His personal memoir "The Alarmist: fifty years measuring climate change" (published in 2021 by Te Herenga Waka University Press) won the best first work of general nonfiction award at the Ockham NZ Book Awards on 11 May.
