FAMILY TIME - THE CHRISTMAS STORY

Now, I need your help to tell the rest of this story of the first Christmas...

Baby: stand, place their hands over their hearts, and say, "Love." Angels: stand, hold out hands like angel wings, and say, "Peace."

Let's practise that....

Right, we will get on with our story:

This story is from the book of Luke, Chapter 2:

Joseph (pause)

went from Nazareth in Galilee, up to Bethlehem in Judah, David's town, for the census.

Joseph (pause)

went with Mary (pause),

to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a baby (pause).

While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her baby (pause).

She gave birth to a son, her firstborn.

Mary (pause)

wrapped him in bands of cloth and laid

the baby (pause)

in a manger because there was no place for them in the inn.

Now to get on with our story. Shepherd and angels, you feature in this next part – would you like to have a quick refresher before we begin?

Shepherds (stand and say baa)

Angels (hold out 'wings' and say 'Peace')

Excellent

There were **shepherds** (pause)

camping in the fields, keeping watch over their sheep through the night.

Suddenly God's **angel** (pause)

stood among them, and God's glory blazed around them.

The **shepherds** (pause) were terrified.

But the angel (pause) said to them, "Don't be afraid;

I'm here to announce a great and joyful event that is meant for everyone, worldwide:

a Saviour has just been born in David's town,

a Saviour who is Messiah and Master.

This is the sign you are looking for: a baby (pause)

wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

At once the angel (pause)

was joined by a huge angelic choir, praising God:

Glory to God in the heavenly heights.

Peace to all on earth who please God!

When the angels (pause)

had left them and gone into heaven,

the **shepherds** (pause)

talked it over: "Let's go over to Bethlehem as fast as we can,

and see for ourselves what God has revealed to us."

and found Mary (pause)

and Joseph (pause),

'You need to book soon. The cottage in Greytown still has some nights free, (even including some weekends) between now and the end of January – it is not available in February. Be in to book your stay..

As a fundraiser for St Andrews on the Terrace to help boost finances affected by Covid-19 cancellations for the St Andrews Centre, we have 3 holiday homes on offer for a short holiday. The owners of these 3 holiday homes have generously agreed to donate all rent received to St Andrews.

Bid for a date at:

- 1) A classic cottage in Greytown at \$90 per night;
- 2) A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night;
- 3) A holiday home at Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

The Cottage in Greytown sleeps up to 4 people (2 bedrooms: one queen, two singles). A separate sleep out has 2 single beds for a larger group.

The house in Whanganui and the house near Picton both sleep up to 6 people.

You need to provide your own towels and sheets. For the houses in Greytown and Whanganui, you are responsible to leave the property as you found it. For the holiday home at Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.

Send me an email to see if the property you would like to rent is available. Weekends tend to be at a premium so book early.

If your requested dates are available, you will be sent confirmation and detailed information about the holiday home and how to reach it, how to get in, instructions about water and power, and you will be sent bank account details for you to pay for your stay.

WIDER CHURCH AND COMMUNITY NOTICES

MESSAGE FROM THE MODERATOR

Tēnā koutou. Greetings to you.

Haere mai tatou, kia koropiko, kia tuohu; kia tukua nga turi ki te aroaro o Ihowa, to tatou Kaihanga. Ko ia hoki to tatou Atua; ko tatou tana iwi e hepara ai, nga hipi a tona ringa. Te Maungarongo, at Ohope Marae, stands on the hill overlooking Ohope and was first established there in 1947. The marae was the first Church-owned marae in Aotearoa New Zealand. Its creation was the dream of Very Rev John (Hoani) Laughton. He saw the need to establish a place for the bicultural partnership implicit in the relationship of the then Maori Synod Te Hinota, now Te Aka Puaho, and the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand, as a whole.

The marae does not display itself flamboyantly, rather, it is ringed by native bush on the slope of the hills. I, like many who have gone before me and those who visit it today, find it a peaceful sanctuary; open to all, available to all, and a

place of significance for all. Our Council of Assembly has a tradition of holding here one of its in-person meetings biennially. We are welcomed and reminded of our history, give thanks to God for those who have gone before us, and are challenged to continue to be people who are committed to work together within the mission of God.

At a recent Council of Assembly meeting, Te Aka Puaho advised Council of the need to undertake some earthworks to retain a slope to the side of Te Maungarongo at the marae. We also heard how for much of the previous two years, COVID restrictions required the marae to be closed. This meant that while the marae still had expenses, there was no income and no opportunity to build reserves to pay for this work. Council warmly and unanimously agreed on behalf to the wider Church to underwrite the cost of this work to enable it to proceed. Council believes that in giving thanks to those that have gone before, and acknowledging Te Maungarongo as a treasure, an icon, we should offer to the Church as a whole an opportunity to both continue to thank God for this place and to contribute financially to the cost of this work. I am writing to you, and your church, your church council, and your presbytery, inviting you to consider this invitation to partner in this way.
