The three options are:

1. A classic cottage in Greytown at \$90 per night;
2. A house in Whanganui, with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV, for \$100 per night;
3. A holiday home at Whatamango Bay, nestled in native bush in the Marlborough Sounds, accessible by car with a 15 minute drive from Picton, for \$100 per night.

The Cottage in Greytown sleeps up to 4 people (2 bedrooms: one queen, two singles). A separate sleep-out has 2 single beds for a larger group.

The house in Whanganui and the house near Picton both sleep up to 6 people. You need to provide your own towels and sheets.

For the houses in Greytown and Whanganui, you are responsible to leave the property as you found it. For the holiday home at Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.

If your requested dates are available, you will be sent confirmation and detailed information about the holiday home and how to reach it, how to get in, instructions about water and power, and you will be sent bank account details for you to pay for your stay.

CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE URGENT TURKEY & SYRIA EARTHQUAKE APPEAL

Turkey and Syria were struck by a major earthquake in the early hours of February 6, 2023 local time. Thousands of buildings have collapsed. Snow has fallen. Many people have lost their lives and been injured in the devastating quakes. Rescuers and local people are working hard to free people buried in the rubble. The initial 7.8 magnitude earthquake has been followed by severe aftershocks in the southeast of Turkey and northwest Syria. People are urgently in need of food, shelter and medical assistance.

Life was already hard. Many people had escaped conflicts and were extremely vulnerable. More than 4 million people were dependent on relief aid before the quakes. About three-quarters of the people living in Syria’s Idlib province had fled fighting in other parts of the country. The people need protection from the bitterly cold winter and cholera. The prices of food and fuel are rising fast. They need practical assistance to survive. If you can, please [donate today](#).

Dear St Andrews on the Terrace Presbyterian Church

Last year we launched our annual Christmas Appeal, Let Hope Flow this Christmas. At the time we very much wanted to focus on people living on the frontline of the climate crisis, never suspecting that it was about to hit Aotearoa New Zealand in the form of significant flooding in Auckland and then Cyclone Gabrielle. Like you, we have followed the news reports with our heartfelt prayers and thoughts.

I want to thank you for supporting the Christmas Appeal. I can report that Christmas Appeal donations are above last year's appeal which was lower than

usual because of the pandemic. I would be grateful if you could check with your treasurer to see if all the donations made to the Christmas Appeal have been passed on to Christian World Service. We would like to acknowledge and receipt donations before March 31 if possible.

The great news is Caleb and his grandmother now have their rainwater system installed! They are very happy and looking forward to the rainy season due in March. The Centre for Community Solidarity, and the local communities, have built 54 new tanks this year at homes and in school. Charles Rwabambari has sent us more than one message of thanks to pass on to you! Since 2018, CCS has built 1,215 rainwater systems transforming the lives of more than 2,000 children and families affected by HIV and AIDS with your donations.

Thank you to for your concern and compassion for people caught up in the Türkiye Syria Earthquake – we have made a short video that you may like to share. ACT Alliance members were running programmes to support some of the many people displaced by the Syrian conflict when the earthquakes struck. After the first earthquake they mobilised help: providing shelter in churches and other buildings, distributing hot meals and food, giving out blankets and hygiene supplies. The earthquake was yet another challenge to displaced Syrians who already live with so much suffering and trauma. As part of ACT Alliance, we can respond and share God's love for all people.

I want to thank you for your prayers and support at a time when we are seeing such devastation here in Aotearoa New Zealand. With this in mind, we encourage people to donate funds for the New Zealand response to local churches, marae and iwi. The Anglican Church has launched a joint appeal. CWS will not be launching its own appeal.

You help make hope flow at Christmas and every day.
