VISIT BY PETER AVERI

Last Friday I was delighted to host Peter Averi at the St. Andrew's organ for a couple of hours. Peter started as organist at St. Andrew's back in 1954 and was extensively involved in the design of the Croft organ which was supplied to the church in 1962. As Peter said after his visit:

"It was a real pleasure to visit the organ gallery after so many years. The rebuild is a splendid success, not only for the modern console facilities which were not

available back in 1962, but also the tonal improvements are excellent. The organ should serve well for at least another 50 years, a valuable asset to Wellington music. It was a delight to see that the original NZBS light signal has been retained, a nice historic reminder of the 1960-70s era when St. Andrew's was very much a "broadcasting" church, with frequent live and recorded recitals by organists, singers, and instrumentalists, as well as the regular church service relays several times a year."

Fun fact – the brass "tube" behind the organist used to be part of a structure at the front of the church. It was "re-purposed" soon after the organ was installed on the gallery when somebody observed that there was somewhat of a risk that the organist could lean back too far and end up in the congregation.

RECORD OF ORGAN RESTORATION DONORS

When the restored organ was re-installed in the gallery, we requested the organ builders to make a book stand on which we could place a book that recorded all of the people who contributed to the project, as an acknowledgement of their generosity and for posterity. RENT-A-BACH OPPORTUNITY

Two families have made their houses available to rent with the proceeds going to St Andrew's to help cover the considerable COVID-caused deficit.

One is a house in Whanganui with a view over the city and all mod cons including Sky TV for \$100 per night.

Both sleep up to six people. You need to provide your own sheets and towels. For the house in Whanganui you need to leave the property as you found it. For Whatamango Bay there is a \$50 end cleaning fee.

Antarctica’s role and response in global climate

Date/time: Wed 5 July 6-7pm

Location: Royal Society of New Zealand, 11 Turnbull St, Thorndon

A lecture by Dr. Natalie Robinson, Physical Oceanographer at NIWA

Royal Society Te Apārangi Wellington Branch and the Royal Society Te Apārangi Joint Public Lecture

Dr. Robinson will discuss Antarctica’s role in, and response to, our changing climate, highlighting its multi-scale connections with the global ocean. The main focus will be on sea ice – the frozen surface of the ocean – which effectively doubles the size of Antarctica each winter and forms a pivotal point of connection between ice, ocean, atmosphere and ecosystem. This annual signal in our climate system helps keep the planet cool; provides a habitat that underpins a thriving marine ecosystem; and drives global ocean overturning. Natalie will describe her own research within this context, and provide some personal stories, accumulated over eight seasons on ice.

Let’s talk Climate workshops by Parents for Climate NZ

Quite often we are advised to have more conversations about climate change but starting these conversations can feel awkward and messy. It isn't always an easy subject to talk about, especially if we are feeling overwhelmed, think we

won't agree or worry about conflict.

Let's Talk Climate aims to equip you with the skills to have good conversations about climate change. When we have good conversations, we experience or deepen a sense of connection, feel like we have been understood and also understand another perspective a bit better. Purely exchanging information or winning an argument is not the goal. The more we can constructively talk about climate change with each other, the more inclusive the solutions will be that work for everyone.

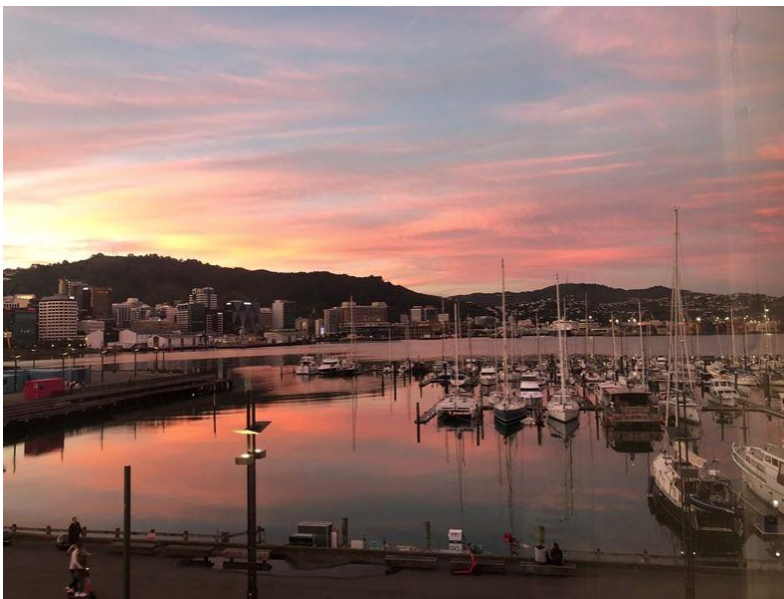

Library Appeal for Theological Colleges in the Pacific

Bula Vinaka! Warm greetings from the Pacific Theological College in Suva, Fiji Islands. PTC is starting a library appeal to assist our local theological schools in the Pacific region. After several travels to the region, and will continue to do so this year and next, the most common issues I have witnessed faced by most theological schools is the need to upgrade their libraries with new recent research materials. Most of the books found in Pacific theological libraries are either old or outdated.

One of the issues of injustices faced by the Pacific region is access to recent research and publications due to costs controlled by mainstream publishers, hence the reason why PTC has launched its own Press last year to serve the needs of our local theological schools and churches: <https://ptc.ac.fj/ptc-press>. Fortunately, there are other organizations who are able to assist with free access to articles and books such as SBL. But we still have a long way to go in terms of printed materials. This issue is not limited to the Pacific, but to many theological schools in the global south.

We are seeking your kind assistance on this matter. We are requesting for any books that you can donate would be very much appreciated. Theological e-books or e-copies would be a good start. I've enclosed a link below to upload any ebooks or e-copies of books, <https://drive.google.com/drive/folders/139IDFvqO3aefARBO1gfkizubCERyq2yR?usp=sharing>. A Google login page appears where you login using your Google accounts or if you are already logged in. Once in, you can right click anywhere on the page and select "Upload Files", browse your e-files to upload. I've copied here our IT staff, Nitesh, if help is needed for uploading.

However if you wish to donate printed books, PTC is willing to pay for the freight to be shipped to PTC plus duty. All donated books will be distributed evenly to all theological schools in the Pacific region. We are looking forward to your kind donations and support.
