TRANSGENDER AWARENESS WEEK

Kia ora

Next week is Transgender Awareness Week, and on Sunday 19 we will be marking Transgender Day of Remembrance and Resilience. I thought this might be a good time to re-introduce myself and to share some tips to help us create a safe space for people visiting us for that service.

I'm Fionn McKenzie, and I use they/them/their pronouns. In other words, when you are referring to me I would like you to use these words, because they fit better for my identity. I know people will make mistakes (some of you have been using different pronouns for me for more than 20 years!) but it makes me happy when people remember.

Many of us automatically make assumptions about other people's experience with gender, often based on stereotypes about gender

expression. Here are a few tips about using language, and trying not to make assumptions.

You can't tell if people are cisgender or trans or nonbinary by looking at them. You can't know what someone's experience of gender is by their clothes or hairstyle or body shape. (Cisgender just means a person whose gender identity is the same as the sex/gender they were assumed to have at birth).

A person's former name, medical history, or anatomy is personal and not necessary for you to know. Let us invite you in, if/when we want to share.

The term "transgender" should only be used as an adjective and never as a noun (i.e. "my friend is transgender" not "my friend is a transgender.") The term "transgendered" is grammatically incorrect.

Nonbinary is an umbrella term for those who don't fit a binary gender (male or female). Some people just use the term nonbinary, but there are lots of other identities that are not binary, e.g. agender, bigender, genderqueer, tāhine, genderfluid.

If someone uses they/them pronouns, grammatically it's the same as when you are talking about a single person of unknown gender. For example "Someone left **their** snapper card at church. I hope **they** didn't need it to get home. Hopefully the office staff will be able to reunite **them** with it." See, you already know how to do this!

WIDER CHURCH AND COMMUNITY NOTICES

CHRISTIAN WORLD SERVICE LAUNCHES GAZA PALESTINE EMERGENCY APPEAL

Christian World Service has launched an emergency appeal to assist people who have been affected by the current conflict in the Middle East, particularly Gaza.

Thousands of people have been killed, injured and displaced. Nearly two hundred people are being held as hostages. Hospitals including the Al Ahli Arab Hospital, schools and homes have been damaged or destroyed. The need for a ceasefire and humanitarian relief is overwhelming.

“The people of Gaza are living in harrowing conditions with limited resources, and we cannot stand idly by while they suffer... Our collective efforts can make a significant difference in the lives of those trapped in this nightmarish situation,” DSPR.

Funds raised will meet some of the urgent needs of people through our long term partner the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees (DSPR). In Gaza, DSPR is providing shelter, food and support to people who have fled the north and who have lost homes. Some churches are hosting Muslim and Christian families from the community. Together they have secured some food supplies, but more will be needed in the months ahead.

DSPR runs three health clinics, vocational training programmes and provides emergency assistance in Gaza. Tragically staff have lost homes and family members. The main office building in Gaza City was severely damaged. Critical medical supplies were stored at the site. DSPR also runs programmes providing emergency relief, education, livelihood support and medical care in Jordan, Lebanon, Nazareth and the West Bank.

CWS is supporting the call for an immediate ceasefire and access for humanitarian relief.

DSPR is an integral part of the local community. It is preparing to help many more people as soon as it practically can with:

- food
- hygiene kits
- shelter
- medications and medical treatment
- psychosocial support

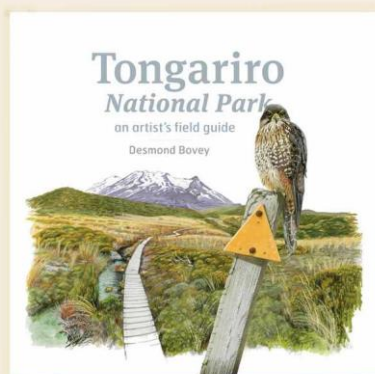

When queer author Desmond Bovey returned to his native New Zealand after thirty years in France, he felt a need to reconnect with the landscapes of his youth. He chose Tongariro National Park, inspired by a chance encounter with a kārearea, the New Zealand falcon.

He returned again and again, sketchbook in hand, applying his delicate brush as he reacquainted himself with the dramatic landforms and ecology of the volcanic plateau.

This exquisite book is the result. With 400 illustrations and an informative yet accessible text, Bovey deconstructs the park's amazing landscapes, giving us not only scenery but the bones beneath. His illustrations present Tongariro's stunning landscapes in relation to the plants and animals that live there,

describing the ways they fit together and depend upon each other for survival in an often harsh and inhospitable environment.

Tongariro National Park is a field guide of rare quality, combining the highest quality of information with superb illustration, a treasure for anyone who loves these wonderful landscapes.
