CHANGE OF DATE: BELONGING IN THIS LAND – TE TERITI WORKSHOPS

Wednesday November 6th 7-9pm

The Social Justice Education Group is hosting the second of two evening workshops on Te Tiriti o Waitangi and responding as people of faith in this land. We invite you to attend both parts of the workshop. Conversation about the Treaty is happening all around us. There is an important opportunity right now to dive into our shared story so that we know our place to stand and how we can belong, wherever our ancestors came from.
