So the chief priests and the elders and the scribes, all the vested interests, were threatened by Jesus. They were afraid he would take away their power and position. Jesus also threatened their world view. Not surprising the way they reacted. Would things be much different today, 2000 years later? And Pilate, the representative of Rome, the Colonizer. For a while Pilate was advocating for Jesus.

But in the end he saw his role as to keep the majority happy, to keep the peace. So finally Pilate agreed to the call of the crowd to crucify Jesus. And the crowd.

Were they innocent and manipulated into calling for the crucifixion of Jesus? Or complicit? Whose interests were really being served? The crowds? Or other groups and individuals? Where was the call of the good women and men? Are there parallels here with our world today? When the crowd, and some power interests behind the scenes cause the oppression or death of a good man – or of good men and good women, children of the God of love and compassion and justice.

Why is the world this way?

Are we humans born sinful? Or are we born good?

If the world is this way – how might we respond?

Help us God as we respond to the world we find ourselves in. Help us to be compassionate to ourselves and others, and also courageous, to do what we perceive to be your will.

We are reminded of Jesus' very human frailty and doubt under the weight of his duty, and the first fall echoes the first of the three times he prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane to be relieved of this burden – "Oh Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me" -. And yet, despite his fear, frailty, and humanity, knowing that it falls to him to fulfil his mission, he finds in God the strength to pick up his burden and go on.

Eternal spirit, may all those who labour under intolerable burdens find in Jesus' example the strength they need to endure. Help us all to find the courage we need to pick up and carry on when our burdens threaten to overwhelm us.

Parenting Jesus was never the easy path, but it's hard to imagine anything that prepared you for this. Mary, we are told, was there at the beginning of this final journey and at the end. We can only imagine what Joseph was experiencing and other whanau members. Having a child die before their parents defies the natural order. Parents today also experience the sword piercing their hearts as they tend children on this road to death, as they bury sons

or daughters after illness, suicide, war, accident or other tragedies that cut lives short. Mary was not alone, she had people supporting her. Sometimes we will be the community for a parent facing the death of their child.

This journey is impossibly hard, it cannot be managed alone.

Prayer

Today we pray for all parents who are tending their dying children, children of any age. Give them the courage to live through the sword piercing their hearts. Provide them with the bravery required to be alongside their child for the final journey, however awful that might be. Give them the strength to share with their child one last time. Let us speak their names no matter the circumstances of the death. Be with us as a community to honour the lives and deaths of all God's children.

not get to his destination. Simon was not chosen for any reason other than to enable Jesus to die in the excruciating way that had been decided.

Prayer

We pray that when each of us comes to a point where we cannot go on alone, there are people who care about us who can help carry the load. People who have our well-being and recovery in their hearts, not just someone to go through the motions.

Here it is, in our faces: flawed humanity. Jesus becomes the embodiment of a person sick, damaged and suffering in spirit, body and soul.

Here we are brought face to face with human weakness, vulnerability, suffering and above all our proclivity to do wrong. It is as if humanity has an addiction to harming others. Sadly, in the 21st century we see many egregious examples of harm – indescribable destruction in Gaza and in Sudan and decisions

at the highest level in the United States and Aotearoa New Zealand intent on harming people. The text tells us that Jesus provides the vessel for becoming whole again, for healing. Jesus as our alter-ego? Jesus, as the part of us that must rise against our own worst nature? Te hikoī o Te Tiriti was a powerful example of our ability to right a wrong. It is an enduring symbol of hope. However we think of wholeness and recovery, we can draw hope from this ancient text and from the Easter message.

Prayer

We pray for recognition of human weakness and vulnerability, and for wholeness and healing, knowing that it will not come easily or quickly to us and that we must strive against the worst of human nature.

He was to be an example to any others who dared to stand against the repressive rule of Rome. Like many we can name in our own world: families clinging on to their

lives in Gaza and Ukraine, migrants in the United States waiting to be rounded up and taken to detention centres, the president of Ukraine ambushed and humiliated in the White House. All these people, like Jesus, stripped of their humanity, given over to the control of the system.

Prayer

May we have a profound respect for the vulnerable and oppressed and stand with them against the systems that humiliate and degrade them. We pray for courage to take risks for our fellow human beings.

Compassionate God, may we and all the world know your presence.

In the Maori world the word *kuia* can mean not only an elderly woman, but a female elder respected in the community often embodying wisdom, experience and leadership. For many of us Pam was one of St Andrew's *kuias*.

She was drawn to this painting because the three blue oil drums reminded her of three *kuia* in her life who had supported and loved her, always.

The three women named in Mark's gospel were three of the many (named and unnamed in the New Testament stories) present, when Joseph of Arimathea took Jesus down from the cross. They were loyal, loving friends and followers of Jesus who as Mark wrote, "provided for him." Those three words say a lot. Jesus valued these women.

Let us take a moment to think of and give thanks for women in our life who are or have been *kuia* for us.

INFORMATION ABOUT ROBERT GAULDIE AND THE PAINTINGS

“Bob Gauldie was an accomplished researcher and academic who built a reputation for pushing boundaries during a career which included more than 150 scientific publications. He was also not afraid of pushing boundaries in his other great love, painting, with one work irking religious traditionalists and coming close to landing him in trouble with the law.

Following an exhibition of his paintings in 1985, Professor Gauldie was asked to paint the Stations of the cross for Wellington Presbyterian Church St Andrew’s on The Terrace. The 14 stations tell the story of Jesus from his death sentence to his entombment, but those painted by Prof Gauldie and first shown at Easter 1987 caused a stir by depicting Christ as a 44-gallon oil drum. The Evening Post newspaper received several letters attacking the work as “blasphemy” and Prof Gauldie recalled how a senior Wellington police officer warned he could be charged with criminal blasphemy, though in the end no action was taken.

Prof Gauldie said using a 44- gallon drum to symbolise Jesus depicted the stations in a way that was “realistic in the religious sense”. “As a symbol they are ubiquitous, loud and associated with trash. They were ideal for my purpose to portray the Stations of the Cross as the brutal murder, the clangorous, violent trashing of Jesus, the reduction of all his teachings to a worthless and brutalised body that was empty of life”.
