All gather around the table and stand quietly.

The Hostess lights the candle and recites the traditional prayer of Jewish mother:

Blessed art thou, O God of the universe, who has sanctified us by thy commandments and commanded us to kindle the festival lights. Blessed art thou, O God of the universe, who hast kept us alive and sustained us and brought us to this season. May this place be consecrated to God, by the light of thy countenance shining upon us in the blessing and bringing of peace.

This is Holy Week, a time that joins for us the Old Covenant and the New Covenant.

PRAYERS FOR THE WORLD

Holy wisdom of God tonight, we recall the meal Jesus shared, and as we remember him and the community around him, we also remember his standing with those who are powerless and without justice.

And so tonight we pray for them – those who are detained without trial those imprisoned for conscience or for faith

those being tortured children kidnapped as child soldiers those who have 'disappeared' those who are abused and exploited those who are refugees those whose lives are in turmoil because of natural disasters those who lack food and shelter those left to die alone.

As Jesus entered the time of his suffering so, we remember those who most closely know this experience.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Welcoming God, you blanket the earth with the invitation to dine as your guests at the feast of life.

You call us to friendship and community

with the intention of healing our brokenness.

Yet, we have offered excuses for not joining in.

We honour correctness more than we value relationship.

We strain to uphold the bitter walls of class, race, and gender so that we might not be shaken by another's pain.

Forgive us, O God.

Renew us that we may be a part of your life.

Open our eyes to the new creation
that awaits our presence.

Draw us together in the memory
of the One who walked into death for the sake of life,
Jesus our brother and our friend. Amen.

ASSURANCE OF FORGIVENESS

We are forgiven.

We will be forgiving, of ourselves and others.

Today Christians and Jews celebrate their own feasts in their own ways. But we need to remember that Jesus was a Jew and so we wish to draw upon the traditional Jewish *Seder* and the words of the New Testament to help us more fully appreciate Jesus' observance of his Jewish heritage.

Matthew's, Mark's and Luke's accounts of Jesus sacrifice for us each begin with his celebration of the paschal meal:

REMEMBERING THE COMMUNITY OF JESUS

They gathered in an upper room to share a meal.

And the names of the apostles were these:

Simon, called Peter,

His brother Andrew.

James

And his brother John - the beloved -

Philip

And Bartholomew.

Thomas

And Matthew the tax collector.

James the son of Alphaeus,

Thaddeus,

Simon the patriot,

And Judas Iscariot.

There were women in the group too:

Mary, called Magdalene,

And Joanna, the wife of Herod's steward Chuza,

and Susanna, and many others

who provided for them out of their resources.

For the community around Jesus,

For the gospel light they lit and passed down,

We give thanks.

For those who went before us and passed the light onto us,

Especially those we remember now,

We give thanks.

(time of silence)

Come Jesus, friend and companion,

take your place as host at this, your table.

THE PEACE

We meet together to share this meal, may it express our love for one another our commitment to each other and point us beyond ourselves to the needs of the world.

The peace of God be with you.

And, with you.

 In the singing, in the silence in the hands expectant, open in the blessing, in the breaking, in the Presence at this table

INVITATION TO THE PASSOVER MEAL:

St Andrew's is an open community and all are invited to Christ's table. Wherever you are on your faith's journey, wherever you have come from and wherever you are going to, whatever you believe, whatever you do not believe, you

are welcome to participate in this Passover meal. This sacred meal is for all people.

PRAYER

We give great thanks for you, community of Jesus who sustained him in his life, who travelled the path with him, who supported him from your resources. we give great thanks for you who reached to him for healing, who challenged him with questions, who shared your table with him, who claimed your place at his. We give great thanks to you who drank in every word who told out his good news and touched him in his leaving and walked with him towards death. and so, with thanksgiving and celebration we praise you who found the stones of your life turned to bread the bitter cup of your sorrow turned to wine. those whose names have been lost to the wind whose stories have been fragmented whose voices echo in the voices of the dispossessed today, calling us to listen we remember you.

Jesus, on this night you took the loaf, made from grain harvested with sweat and oppression, beaten and sifted, ground and kneaded, baked and given with love – and declared it holy.

On this night, you took the cup, made from the careful harvest of fruit, crushed, filtered, fermented and poured with love – and declared it holy. As we come again to that sacred night, that sacred meal, we also lift the bread, bless it, break it and claim that this bread is broken and this wine is poured and given with mystery and mercy.

You ask us to remember you – your body, your humanness, your life. We remember.

TRADITIONAL PASSOVER PRAYERS

The Kiddush

The Leader takes the cup of wine and recites this blessing

Blessed be thou, O God of the universe Creator of the fruit of the vine. Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God of the universe who hast chosen us among all peoples and sanctified us with Thy Commandments. In love hast Thou given us, O God, solemn days of joy and festive seasons of gladness, even this day of the feast of the unleavened bread, a holy convocation unto us, a memorial of the departure from Egypt. Thou hast chosen us for thy service and hast made us sharers in the blessing of Thy holy festivals. Blessed art Thou, O God, Who hast preserved us, sustained us, and brought us to this season.

All take up their cups

THE CUP OF BLESSING

All drink

Eating the Greens

Leader: Blessed art Thou O God of the universe, Creator of the fruit of the earth. *All present eat of the greens dipped in salt water.*

Breaking the Matzo

The Leader lifts up the matzo (bread) and says:

Lo, this is the bread of affliction which our fathers and mothers ate in the land of Egypt. Let all who are hungry come and eat. Let all who are in want come and celebrate the Passover with us. May it be God's will to redeem us from all trouble and from all servitude. Next year at this season may the whole house Israel be free.

The Leader replaces the matzo on its plate... THE BREAD OF LIFE

HALLEL: PSALMS OF PRAISE

Leader: In the Passover, the first two psalms of the Hallel--the hymns of praise which the Jews recited at the great feasts--are recited.

All recite Psalm 113 In Praise of God's Goodness

1 Praise God!

You servants of God, praise God's name!

2 May God's name be praised, now and for ever.

3 From the east to the west praise the name of God!

4 God rules over all nations; God's glory is above the heavens.

5 There is no one like our God. God lives in the heights above,

6 but bends down to see the heavens and the earth.

7 God raises the poor from the dust; And lifts the needy from their misery **8** and makes them companions.

Praise God!

SHARING THE PASSOVER/LAST SUPPER MEAL TOGETHER The bread of life. The cup of blessing.

Come for all is ready, the gifts of God for the people of God.

AFTER THE MEAL:

JESUS' PRAYER Jim Cotter paraphrase **Eternal Spirit** Life-Giver, Pain-Bearer, Love-Maker, source of all that is and that shall be, Father and Mother of us all, loving God, in whom is heaven: the hallowing of your name echo through the universe! The way of your justice be followed by the peoples of the world! Your heavenly will be done by all created beings! Your commonwealth of peace and freedom sustain our hope and come on earth. With the bread we need for today, feed us. In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us. In times of temptation and test, strengthen us. From trials too great to endure, spare us. From the grip of all that is evil, free us. For you reign in the glory of the power that is love, now and for ever. Amen.
