We remember that on the night before his death he shared the Passover Meal with his disciples and gave the meal a new significance and purpose. May the passion for life as seen in Jesus and in the lives and struggles of many other committed and faithful people then and now,

enable us to dream and to risk....

Together may we celebrate the possibilities and hope we each have and are called to share.

SUSTAINABILITY UPDATE

The sustainability group met this week and reviewed how we're going on our Eco Church Action Plan. We're making good progress! Frank Cook has started work on an energy audit for the church and centre and Sonia Groes-Petrie is looking at the best way to analyse and monitor our water usage. It's worth having a look at the stories on Eco Church Aotearoa's website to see what other eco churches are doing. Some are quite inspiring. A couple of events are happening next week: the first Just Sew session at the Sustainability Trust on 7 June and a Repair Cafe in Karori on 8 June. More details are here. It's easy to feel disheartened about the current state of the world and our own Government going backwards on environmental sustainability and climate action. So, to keep us inspired, I'm going to introduce a Weekly Win in this spot. RECYCLING OF HOUSEHOLD BATTERIES

Household batteries can be dropped off for FREE at Karori Library, Kilbirnie Library, Te Awe Library (Brandon St), Island Bay Community Centre, Newlands Community Centre, Tawa Community Centre, and the Southern Landfill Tip Shop. For Hutt Valley and other members, Bunnings' stores have recycling bins where used batteries can be left. Happy recyclin

RECYCLING AT ST ANDREW'S

During May we saved **5.8kg** of waste from landfill, slightly up on the previous month. This month metal lids were the hero knocking Tetra Pak beverage cartons off their perch. As a reminder, we collect all types of plastic lids, metal lids, Tetra Pak beverage cartons and used pens for recycling. There are containers for each sort of material in the North Vestry and a take-home information sheet about what we do and don't collect. Please make sure everything you drop off is clean and dry and follow the instructions for preparing Tetra Paks, in particular. (They need to be opened out flat and kept as one piece, i.e. not cut up.) Thanks for all your recycling efforts. It's really making a difference to what goes into landfill. - Anna Smith, Sustainability Group
