Excerpt from an article by Ian Harris

"Our question is basically the same as the Jewish exiles asked in Babylon back in the 500s BC: How shall we sing the Lord's song in this new and strange land? But let's always remember that each of us operates within two thought worlds. There's the world where that rational thinking, intellectual analysis and logic are exactly what we need (loosely summarised as left-brain thinking). But there's also the unpindownable world of the imagination, creativity, literature, music, art, what we sense as the spiritual, an elusive fifth force beyond the four fundamental forces of physics. That's the world loosely summarised as right-brain thinking.

Those worlds are not identical. Neither can do the work of the other. But they come together and have equal value in the functioning of our single brain. One tells us heaps about the world as it is, the other stimulates us to think of the world as it could be, as it ought to be. In our journey towards a fuller and more rounded life, we need to engage both.

Dear Congregation. Our next exploring faith session using the progressive Christianity book. Awakened, will be on Sunday 13th July. It will start at 12 noon and finish by 1 pm. Conference room 3. This next chapter is titled Diversity: Confronting our own biases. You are very welcome in the session whether you have been before or not. Each session is stand alone. The focus Bible quote for the session is as follows: The Lawyer answered Jesus, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbour as yourself." And Jesus said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this and you will live." But wanting to vindicate himself, the lawyer asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbour?" (Luke 10:27-29) The session will include reading of the progressive reflection on this topic, discussing some focus questions together and watching a brief video from Caleb Lines expanding on the topic. SUSTAINABILITY UPDATE

The Sustainability Group is looking at extending the types of material we collect at St Andrew's for recycling. Possible introductions are: **1.Razors and their packaging**, including refillable and disposable blades. **2.Haircare containers** including empty aerosols, pumps, jars, bottles, tubes and soft plastic pouches. **3.Small metal items** such as drink bottles, tools, nuts and bolts, pots and pans, coat hangers, cutlery and keys. I will distribute a sheet on Sunday for people to select which materials they're most interested in recycling. This week's **Good News:** The Warehouse is piloting a scheme to help reduce the thousands of tonnes of textiles that end up in landfill each year. The Petone store is one of five stores across the mōtu that's introducing a "Good Drop" collection bin. Customers who drop off used clothing will be given a discount at the store. Wearable clothing will be donated to the Salvation Army to resell in its Family Stores. (*The Post*, 1 July 2025) - Anna Smith, Sustainability Group

RECYCLING AT ST ANDREW'S

During June we saved **5.46kg** of waste from landfill, slightly down on the previous month. TetraPak beverage cartons were the hero during June and definitely accounted for the greatest volume. As a reminder, we collect all types of plastic lids, metal lids, Tetra Pak beverage cartons and used pens for recycling. There are containers for each sort of material in the North Vestry and a take-home information sheet about what we do and don't collect. Please make sure everything you drop off is clean and dry and follow the instructions for preparing Tetra Paks, in particular. (They need to be opened out flat and kept as one piece, i.e. not cut up.) Thanks for all your recycling efforts.
