

SOCIAL JUSTICE GROUP 27TH JULY 12-1PM CONFERENCE ROOM 3

The pilot of the Community Sponsorship scheme has been running for three years. DISABILITY ACCESS PROJECT STARTS 29 JULY

LT McGuinness will begin their set up at the front of the church from Tuesday 29 July. They will raise the level of the church portico floor so that it is level with the church entrance (no more step up into the church), build a new ramp and restore the steps on the south side of the portico. The project will take approximately two months and is weather-dependent. The front entrance will be blocked off for the duration. We will use the side doors of the church for entrance and exit, with the door on the north side (adjacent to the Centre) being the main entrance/exit. The locks have been oiled and/or changed to make that door easier to open and so it can be opened from the outside. The gallery will be closed during construction so that we don't exceed reduced numbers in the church at any one time to comply with fire regulations set down in the Certificate of Public Use issued by the Wellington City Council. Please note too that we will need to keep the alley free of bicycles during construction so that they do not impede access. These can either be parked in the bike rack at the top of the ramp or around the back of the hall on the south side of the buildings. SUSTAINABILITY UPDATE

Last Sunday, Cam Smart shared his positive experience of going to a Repair Cafe in Ngaio. From memory, he had a jersey repaired, an electrical appliance tested for safety and a great experience of community spirit. There are lots of other services on offer from Repair Cafes which are run regularly in different places, on a koha basis. My local one, in Karori, has volunteers skilled in fixing electrical and general goods, clothing, woodwork and jewellery. Go to the Repair Café Aotearoa website (www.repaircafeaotearoa.co.nz) to see if a Cafe runs near you. Your community newspaper might also publish dates of upcoming local Cafes.

This week's **Good News**: More people are getting on their bikes in Wellington, Auckland and Christchurch with numbers rising year on year, according to a Radio NZ report (https://tinyurl.com/yy2amjm9). In Wellington, the four key routes into the central city have seen a 9.1 per cent increase year on year to 87,000 trips, in March. Newtown to the city is the most popular route. - Anna Smith, Sustainability Group
