SUSTAINABILITY UPDATE

I am personally concerned about the waste produced by fast fashion where inferior fabric is turned into garments made overseas in sweat shops, sold here very cheaply but with unsold stock often going into landfill. The NZ fashion industry is very aware of the problem but the cost of creating ethically produced garments is very high in NZ. I was delighted to read about an initiative called Precious Collaborative. The Auckland designer Liz Mitchell creates a beautiful and artistic coat to be sold for \$10,000.00. The sale of this garment - the

Precious Coat - subsidises up to 20 garments sold at reasonable prices thus supporting everyday people to make better fashion choices and by using mostly NZ made fabric (wool) and local craftspeople, create a much more sustainable contribution to the industry. They also offer a mending service for their garments. They have a good website where you can see a coat as well as everyday garments for sale. claire@preciouscollaborative.nz Janet Martin.

RECYCLING AT ST ANDREW'S

Congratulations! During August we saved **9.5kg** of waste from landfill. This is up on previous months, partly because we are now collecting heavier household metal items. In the six months since we have been measuring our impact, we have saved **38.5kg**. This is in addition to the milk bottle tops that Brian Burrell adds to his sack for the Sustainability Trust. As a reminder, we have added two new categories to our collection hub - household metal items and hair care and hair colour containers and aerosols. They join all types of plastic lids, metal lids, Tetra Pak beverage cartons and used pens. There are containers for each sort of material in the North Vestry and a take-home information sheet about what we do and don't collect. Make sure you have one at home for easy reference. Thanks for all your recycling efforts. It's really making a difference to what goes into landfill. - Anna Smith, Sustainability Group

Household batteries can be dropped off for FREE at Karori Library, Kilbirnie Library, Te Awe Library (Brandon St), Island Bay Community Centre, Newlands Community Centre, Tawa Community Centre, and the Southern Landfill Tip Shop. For Hutt Valley and other members, Bunnings' stores have recycling bins where used batteries can be left. Happy recycling.
